Remarks for the Enterprise Corporation of the Delta November 5, 2001

I was at the Tennessee-LSU game a few weeks ago in Knoxville. As my son and I looked out over the crowd, he commented to me that there must be 10,000 different ways to wear orange.

That simple statement helped me realize another fact – there must be 10,000 different ways to do business today.

That's what we're doing in Mississippi, and it's part of what we're doing here today.

I am committed to the economic growth of the Delta region, a commitment I share with Governor Huckabee and Governor Foster. Our dedication to the people and potential is solid.
