- Recognize George Walker (chairman, State Board for Community Colleges)
- In the invitation to speak here today, I was asked to talk about workforce development, economic development and performance improvement
  - o I'm happy to do just that
  - o Mississippi is setting a new standard for others to follow in this area

- Every state impacted by national recession
  - More than \$7 trillion lost in stockmarket
  - More than two million Americans out of work
  - States cutting school week / releasingprisoners / massive lay-offs
- Have to protect people in short term / prepare for long term
- ■Best way to do that is through investing in education and creating jobs
  - o Everybody benefits from good schools

- Education must be first priority for MSMaking great progress
  - Teacher pay / 49<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> when fully implemented
  - Test scores up / accountability
     standards stronger than "No Child
     Left Behind"
  - Princeton Review: MS has 6<sup>th</sup> best testing system in nation
  - MS 6<sup>th</sup> in nation in National Board
     Certified Teachers
  - Computers in Classroom

- Keeping education a priority with a budget that puts Schools First / 62 percent
  - MS first state in nation to fully fund education and fund it first
  - o Other states cutting to the bone
- We're proving to the people of MS that we're serious about education
  - Making the investment now for dividends tomorrow
- When it comes to education, we mean business
  - o Business means jobs

- Mississippi's image changing in the business community
  - Site Selection magazine / top 10 for doing business
  - o Top 10 state for small business survival
- Four Mississippi cities ranked in America's 50 hottest cities for manufacturing expansions and relocations out of more than 300 metropolitan areas
  - Gulfport / Biloxi / Pascagoula tied for
     35<sup>th</sup>
  - o Jackson ranked 39<sup>th</sup>

- Last weekend, went down to Gulfport to see new Carnival cruise ship, the Conquest
  - o Sailing out of Gulfport now
  - Working to make it a permanent arrangement
  - Confident that will happen / folks inNew Orleans scared it will happen
- Article in New Orleans Time-Picayune about Carnival cruise ship
  - o Some telling comments about the work we're doing to grow Mississippi

- Vice President of Public Relations for New Orleans Chamber had this to say:
  - o "Mississippi has been aggressively developing its port. The fact that they were able to step in and fill that gap, it does show that Mississippi continues to pursue a sound growth program."
- ■Owner of the Court of Two Sisters restaurant in the French Quarter:
  - o "I think it's a fiasco. It's a black eye for the city, it's a serious amount of dollars to the city."

- General manager of the Chateau Sonesta Hotel:
  - o "It's publicity you can't buy. Now, it's sailing from Gulfport, and obviously that's not good for us."
- Recent article in the Detroit News about the auto industry
  - Mississippi's landing of Nissan cited as success story
  - o "Mississippi got...the chance to be the beachhead for Nissan's latest assault on the rich U.S. market. The plant makes Mississippi a magnet for investment by hungry auto suppliers."

- One other sentence in the Detroit News article
  - o "Governor Ronnie Musgrove has made it clear that among the things he might cut to manage his state's nagging deficit, economic development won't be one of them."
- They're right / I won't cut our efforts to grow Mississippi
  - o I can give you 2.8 million reasons why that's the case

- Job creation from January 2000 to February 2003
  - o 2,103 new and expanded facilities
  - o 50,253 new jobs
  - o Total investment of \$14.1 billion (\$14,129,936,686, to be exact)
- ■MS Rural Economic Impact Authority
  - \$20M to help with economic development in rural areas
  - Funding to cover workforce training at community colleges

- ■MS's potential not exclusive to metropolitan areas
  - o Promise of our people is just as strong in rural areas
  - Fighting to bring quality jobs to every Mississippian
- The new standard we have set as a state is also a reflection of the high standards of those we honor today
  - Standards of excellence / performance
  - Commitment to turning obstacles into opportunities
- That's what's making a difference for Mississippi
