History of the Building/Land

- 1923 Rosenwald family would build a facility to be used for educational purposes if the residents of the community would provide equal dollar match
- 1923 a tornado hit the area destroying the Macedonia Church leaving the parishioners with no place to worship and the children with no school.
- The community pulled together with one resident, Ed Griffin donating timber, Washington James using his sawmill and the Rosenwald family letting the community's donations serve as part of the matching funds.
- The school was built and the school session began in 1925 with teachers on the payroll but with very little funds to make payroll.
- Once again the community came together to find creative ways to raise the money for teachers salaries.
- Some years later, through the Panola County Board of Education, the school was taken into the state and county school system.
- Early 1960's, Macedonia Public School consolidated with West Side Elementary School and became a part of the South Panola School System
- 1965, the facility was used as a Project Head Start Building and remained in operation until 1989.
- Two churches, Concord & Macedonia decided to do something with the Old Macedonia School.
- Each church put in a small amount of funds to secure a matching grant to pay for an architect and feasibility study of repairing the old school, which found to be cost prohibitive.
- Fall of 1999, the board, with the approval of both church memberships, decided to tear down the building and build a new facility in the same site.
- The building has served as a church and school where funeral services, weddings, marriages and family reunions have been held.
