- Proud to be in Tupelo / share in celebration
of life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

- Dr. King was a man ahead of his time
 - Had a vision for this country
 - Had leadership skills to lead us to the
reality of that vision
 - Leadership is action, not position

- Want to talk today about leadership and action in context of 21st century MS
 - Where are we on meeting the vision of Dr. King?

- Last week in state of the state, talked about effect of national recession
 - More than \$7 trillion lost in stock market
 - More than a million American out of work
 - States cutting school week / releasing prisoners / massive lay-offs

- Effects of national recession hit the just and the unjust
 - Recession has no respect for political parties
 - Every state affected

- Have to deal with the impact here in MS
 - Protect people in short term / prepare for long term

- Best way to do that is through education
 - Everybody benefits from good schools

- Comprehensive plan for education
 - Teacher pay
 - Test scores
 - Computers in Classroom

- Time to go to next level
 - Summer Start program / reduce drop-out rates and increase skills
 - Save the state millions

- \$200 million “brain trust”
 - Recruit best minds for research, development, workforce training

- Investments in education benefit every Mississippian, not just students
 - People want to live in good communities
 - Good schools, good jobs, good communities

- In 1948, Dr. King wrote from Morehouse College that “education must enable a man to become more efficient, to achieve with increasing facility the legitimate goals of his life”
 - That sums up what education can do for all people of MS
 - Have to be willing to make the investment to make that happen

- Have called on Legislature to fund education in one comprehensive bill
 - Fund it at 62 percent of general fund
 - Time to prove that when it comes to education, we mean business
 - Business means jobs

- Have continued to create quality jobs during national recession
 - Nearly 50,000 new jobs in past three years / \$13.5 billion invested

- Building jobs across the spectrum
 - Nissan = \$1.5 billion investment / more than 5,000 direct jobs
 - MS also one of top 10 states for small business survival

- We have the right policies and programs in place to attract business / grow MS
 - Economic development is economic development
 - 2 people in a truck or 5,000 building a truck

- Have to create opportunities across the board
 - Rural areas hit hardest by NAFTA
 - Have to be smart and aggressive in creating jobs

- That's the driving force behind MS Rural Economic Impact Authority
 - Assistance to new and existing business
 - Training for people who have lost jobs

- As leaders in this area, encourage you to lead by action, not position
 - Encourage investment in education
 - Encourage investment in economic development
 - Prepare today for benefits tomorrow

- Preparation depends on cooperative action between states
 - Work together to benefit people / region

- So much potential for MS
 - Need to invest now to realize full promise and potential
 - Good schools, good jobs, good communities

- Those are the results of good leadership
 - Those are the results our people demand and deserve

■ In October 1967, 6 months before he was assassinated, Dr. King spoke to a group of junior high school students in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

○ Main question he posed to them – what is your life's blueprint?

■ He had his thoughts on what should go into that blueprint

○ Deep belief in own dignity and worth

○ Determination to achieve excellence
