- June of this year, came to dedicate the marker across the street
- Spot where the legendary B.B. King started playing the blues
- Countless others have taken their inspiration from him

- This has been an exciting year for the blues, in Mississippi and nationwide
- In August of 2002, our Congress officially proclaimed 2003 as "The Year of the Blues"
- Mississippi is the undisputed birthplace of the blues
- 1903, W.C. Handy, was sitting on a railroad platform in Tutwiler listening to a man play what he described as "the weirdest music I had ever heard", thus the blues were born
- We've produced some of the world's finest blues musicians
  - o W.C. Handy
  - o Muddy Waters
  - o Robert Johnson
  - o Howlin' Wolf
  - o John Lee Hooker
  - o And, B. B. King- (Who I named as blues ambassador for the State of MS in June of this year)

- They have all shaped and defined this authentic and truly American form of music
- From Greenville to Clarksdale, from Indianola to Tutwiler
  - We've shown the world our musical talent
- The blues has been performed, studied, and emulated around the world
  - o But it all began here
  - o Proud of Mississippi's blues heritage
- In February of this year I also proclaimed 2003 as "The Year of the Blues"
- help of the MS Development Authority and its Tourism Division / we've been promoting the blues in Mississippi / in America, and around the world

- There have been several blues festivals held statewide this year
  - Deep Delta Festival in Rolling Fork
  - B.B. King Homecoming in Indianola
  - Highway 61 Blues Festival in Leland and
  - Muddy River Music Fest in Columbus
- Week-long celebration at the state's welcome centers with special media tour of cities in the MS delta that culminated at the Delta Heritage and Blues Festival in Greenville-the 2<sup>nd</sup> oldest blues festival in the U.S.
- Clint Eastwood, Martin Scorsese, and five other directors even filmed a seven-part series entitled "The Blues", that aired on PBS in September- in which they trace the origin of the blues from Africa to the Mississippi delta

- Mississippi- the birthplace of the blues and several nationally known artist has had a tremendous effect culturally, musically, and historically on the people of all ages and races
- In order to continue to promote, advance, and foster an appreciation of the blues in our state, nationally, and worldwide- the Mississippi Blues Commission has been established
- The board will consist of 15 members who will analyze the tourism potential of the blues in Mississippi, particularly in the delta and prepare a plan for marketing the blues to conferences, music performances, filmmakers and others
