 - May 2002: Discussed medical
 malpractice issue at MEC luncheon
 - Called special session to address urgent needs
- Some relief came out of that session, but Legislature waited on my proposal for insurance pool
 - Pleased legislation was passed this year creating Medical Malpractice Insurance Availability Act
 - o Signed it April 24

- Remain committed to fair and balanced reforms that will strengthen both the quality of health care and your ability to deliver it
 - This is important for all Mississippians and our future
 - o Healthy kids go to school ready to learn
 - o Healthy adults are ready to work
 - o That's good for all of us
