Purpose of Grant Proposal

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers program provides grants to rural and inner-city public schools or consortia of such schools to enable them—with the assistance of community partners—to plan, implement, or expand projects that benefit the educational, health, social services, cultural, and recreational needs of the community. 21st Century Community Learning Centers enable school districts to fund public schools as community education centers, keeping children safe in the afterschool hours and providing academic enrichment, homework centers and tutors, and a range of cultural, developmental and recreational opportunities. In addition, lifelong learning activities are available for community members in a local school setting. School-based 21st Century Community Learning Centers that have been established around the country are providing safe, drug-free, supervised and cost-effective afterschool, weekend or summer havens for children, youth and their families. The program is designed to target funds to rural and urban communities that have low achieving students and high rates of juvenile crime, school violence, and student drug abuse, but lack the resources to establish afterschool centers.

School Districts in the Proposal

The following school districts joined the consortium in order to be considered in this grant proposal:

Benoit, Choctaw, East Jasper, Greenville, Greenwood, Hancock, Hattiesburg, Hazlehurst, Indianola, Jackson Public, Laurel, Leflore County, Leland, Louisville, Moss Point, Oktibbeha, Pearl River, Petal, Pontotoc, Prentiss County, Quitman County, Rankin, Sunflower, Tupelo, Western Line, Winona, and Yazoo City.

Participating in this consortium does not preclude a local school district from applying directly to the USDOE for a 21st Century Community Learning Center grant.

The Mississippi Department of Education is taking the lead in developing the 3-year grant application but, if proposal is awarded, will not receive any of the funds. Tupelo School District will serve as the fiscal agent and coordinating school district for the consortium.

About Mississippi's Proposal

Project HOPE is designed to help students and parents in Mississippi achieve higher standards and secure brighter futures. The goals of Project HOPE match the USDOE's program requirements by providing the following: Literacy education programs Senior citizen programs Children's day care services Integrated education, health, social service, recreational or cultural programs Summer and weekend school programs in conjunction with recreational programs Nutrition and health programs Expanded library service hours to serve community needs Telecommunications and technology education programs for individuals of all ages Parenting skills education programs Support and training for child day care providers Employment counseling, training and placement Services for individuals who leave school before graduating from secondary school, regardless of the age of such individual, and Services with children with disabilities.

The proposal includes an array of inclusive and supervised services that include expanded learning opportunities (such as enriched instruction, tutoring or homework assistance) for children. It will also focus activities in the areas of arts, academics, athletics, and acclamations of self worth by partnering with community agencies, businesses, and individuals.
