We've watched as nations around the world have collectively shared in our grief, and the symbols of their caring cannot be forgotten.

In London, the military band at Buckingham Palace played our national anthem. In Quebec, an Episcopal cathedral replaced the Canadian flag with the American flag at half-staff.

In places around the world, citizens are sharing our grief and holding us close.

Today, on the steps of this building that represents the ideals of our nation, we are gathering to pray and remember those people and those ideals that draw us together. We are joined by religious leaders from around the community, and I invite them now to offer prayer and reflection on this time.
