WHEREAS, Mr. Morgan Freeman was born on June 1, 1937 in Memphis, Tennessee—he lived with his grandmother in Charleston, Mississippi, for several years until his family settled in Greenwood, Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, he graduated high school with the intentions of becoming a fighter pilot in the United States Air Force and found that he had a penchant for acting instead; and

WHEREAS, he began his acting career in an African-American production of "Hello, Dolly"—this lead to his role as "Easy Reader" in the PBS series, "The Electric Company" (1971-1975); and

WHEREAS, after several years with PBS, he began garnering several TV roles before he received his first Oscar nomination for his role as Fast Black in "Street Smart" in 1987; and

WHEREAS, he received two additional Oscar nominations for his roles in "Driving Miss Daisy" (1989) and the prison drama "The Shawshank Redemption" (1994); and

WHEREAS, in 1993, Mr. Freeman made his feature directorial debut with the story of a South African family divided by apartheid in "Bopha"—he added producer to his impressive resume with the TV drama "Mutiny" in (1999); and

WHEREAS, Mr. Freeman has maintained his ties with the State of Mississippi as a resident of Charleston, Mississippi, and through countless civic and cultural contributions; and

WHEREAS, the Piney Woods School will be honoring Morgan Freeman for his support for the school and his invaluable contributions in the fields of education and film:
