  - Improving the quality of life for all of its2.8 million citizens
- As Governor these are the priorities I have focused on
  - Also the priorities that the Pike County area has focused on

- In May of this year the city of Magnolia received an economic development grant for \$500,000 to make public facilities improvements on behalf of Southeastern Railway Surfaces, Inc.
- Thank the city of Magnolia and Pike County for taking the initiative and seeking to improve existing industry and the quality of life for its residents
- The same initiative is also evident in the rich development we see throughout Pike County and its Industrial Park
  - With over 35 industrial facilities ranging from fabric mills and poultry processors to packaging manufactures

- Pike County also offers customized industrial training programs provided through Southwest Mississippi Community College
  - o for new industries who plan to move to Pike County through MDA
- Investing in the people of Pike County to reap the dividends for years to come
- By working together, we have accomplished a lot, but it hasn't been easy in these tough economic times

- Invested in existing industry and brought new industry to south Mississippi
  - Expanded Northrup Grumman with2,000 new jobs
  - Expanded Howard Computers with over
     2,000 new direct jobs and over 10,000
     indirect jobs in the years to come
  - ValueLine Furniture with over 100 new jobs
- Image of MS in 2003 is far different than the image most know and unlike anything anyone could have imagined
  - We are moving faster than anyone else into the 21<sup>st</sup> century

- We are competing and leading in the global marketplace
- It's an image of people working in highly-skilled, well-paying jobs
- It's an image of children in classrooms equipped with the technology to bring the world to their desk
- ■It's an image of companies looking for a place to do business in the state
- We are setting new standards for education and economic development

  Over 2,200 new and expanded facilities

- Total investment in Mississippi nearly \$15 billion
- Companies are coming to Mississippi because the word is out about what we can do
- Public schools are the **key** to a successful economy
  - o And the cornerstone of our communities

- Good schools / lead to good jobs / good jobs lead to better communities / good communities lead to an even better Mississippi
- Some states are not willing to invest in education, but Mississippi isn't one of them
- Historic action of fully funding education first
- That is the way it should always be

- Our hard work in education is paying off across the state
  - As our children reap the fruits of our labor
- Test Scores are improving
  - Just last week / the results of the 2003
     National Assessment of Educational
     Progress scores came out
  - Our eighth graders math scores are up12 points
    - compared to the nations score which is only up 10 points
  - Our fourth graders math scores are up 7points
    - compared to the nations score which is only up 4 points

- o With our State Accountability system
  - more than 80% of Mississippi public schools have achieved a rating of Level 3 Successful or higher
- Under the federal NCLB accountability system
  - 50% of MS schools met the Adequate Yearly Progress
     Requirements
- NCLB score: Alabama 33%, Delaware
   43%, Tennessee 53%, and Florida
   13%

- We have not stopped with just improving the test scores
  - o Teacher pay / 49<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> / when fully implemented
  - o Computers in the Classroom
    - First state in the nation
  - 6<sup>th</sup> in the nation in National Board
     Certified Teachers
  - Princeton Review: Mississippi has 12<sup>th</sup>
     best testing system in nation
