Talking Points

- In June 2000 the U.S. Department of Education, with the support of three private foundations created the National Commission on the High School Senior Year.
- This commission is examining students' experiences in the last year of high school and recommending ways to better prepare them to continue their education or to enter the workforce.

- The Schools-to-Careers program also provides students job-shadowing opportunities so they can experience a career first hand.
- Teachers can even take part in apprenticeships and internships in a variety of careers so they know what skills their students will need to get good jobs.

- Having that hands-on knowledge gives our teachers an advantage that can be passed on to our students.
