WHEREAS, born in Atlanta, Georgia, Dorothy Norwood began singing and touring with her family at the age of eight years old; and

WHEREAS, in 1956, she moved to Chicago, Illinois and was soon singing with such notables as the late great Mahalia Jackson, the world famous Caravans, and Reverend James Cleveland; and

WHEREAS, Dorothy Norwood launched her career in 1964 by recording her first album, “Johnny and Jesus,” with Savoy Records, which brought her national attention and a Gold Album; and

WHEREAS, she was subsequently introduced to European audiences in a critically acclaimed tour of Germany, France, and England along with such gospel greats as the Harmonizing Four and the Gospelairees; and

WHEREAS, one of the highlights of her career came in 1972 when she was signed by Mick Jagger and the Rolling Stones on their American Tour which was a great success covering 30 states and cities; and

WHEREAS, Dorothy Norwood returned to Europe in 1980 to tape a special for British television along with such luminaries as Marian Williams, the Reverend James Cleveland, the Southern California Community Choir and special guest Natalie Cole—the show was a phenomenal success and received excellent reviews in the British press; and

WHEREAS, she returned to England in 1990 to perform concerts in London, Birmingham and North Hampton:
