Mississippi Prison Work Crews Provide Valuable Free Public Service Labor

Jackson -. Mississippi residents benefited greatly from the state prison system's public service work program during FY '02. According to a recently completed report on external public service work provided by state inmates, a combined total of 168,371 man-hours of public service work was provided by prisoners off institutional grounds during fiscal year ending on June 30, 2002. The value of this work totaled more than \$867,000 when calculated at minimum wage.

According to the report's findings, a major portion of the free inmate labor was attributed to the prisons' *Mobile Work Crews (MWC)*, which are comprised of minimum-security inmates. In addition, inmates sentenced to the prison system's *Regimented Inmate Discipline (RID)* program accounted for 11,520 man-hours of the total free public service labor during this time period.

A breakdown of the prison labor provided by the state's three public institutions during FY2002 indicated:

Equally important, the free labor performed by our prisoners provides invaluable assistance to local communities during these difficult economic times."

Some of the work projects included: maintenance work on county court houses and police departments; painting public buildings; road work drainage projects; cutting grass around public buildings; and maintenance work on state parks facilities.
