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GOVERNOR MUSGROVE HONORS COOPER LIGHTING FOR SAFETY MILESTONE

Governor Ronnie Musgrove recently recognized Cooper Lighting in Vicksburg for more than 4 million man-hours without a lost-time accident. The presentation was held on Monday, February 18, 2002, at the plant located on Highway 61 South.

"Mississippi's workforce is among the most skilled and dedicated in the nation. Cooper Lighting's milestone recognizes that our workers put safety first and are committed to maintaining a productive, successful work environment," said Governor Musgrove.

Overall, Cooper's plants are among the safest in the United States with accident rates approximately half the nationwide average for the manufacturing sector. Among these plants, the Cooper Lighting plant in Vicksburg is a true pacesetter having one of the lowest accident rates in the company.

"Our 2001 safety performance is a tribute to our employees and recognizes their efforts to make this plant a success," said Mickey Robertson, Director of Operations. "Being honored by the Governor is a great way to acknowledge the importance of manufacturing to Mississippi's economy and this plant's efforts to set the standard for worker safety, environmental protection, product quality and service to our customers."

Cooper Lighting, a division of Cooper Industries, manufactures fluorescent, incandescent and HID lighting fixtures for indoor and outdoor use. Products are used worldwide in homes and commercial buildings, including landscapes, shopping centers, sports facilities, parking lots, high-security areas and industrial plants. Headquartered in Peachtree City, Georgia, Cooper Lighting has manufacturing facilities in 13 domestic and four international locations, including the Vicksburg operation. The Vicksburg facility currently employs 800 people.

GULF COAST CASINOS SET RECORDS IN JANUARY

Mississippi casinos received a 7 percent gross revenue boost in January 2002. On the Coast, the casinos took in more than \$100 million in a recordbreaking month.

The 30 state-regulated casinos won \$243.5 million from gamblers last month, up from \$227.6 million in January 2001, according to figures released Wednesday by the Mississippi Tax Commission.

The 12 casinos on the Coast won \$100.6 million and for the first time since legalized gambling began 10 years ago topped \$100 million in January. The figure was 3 percent more than the same month in 2001.

The 18 casinos on the Mississippi River in Tunica, Lula, Greenville, Vicksburg and Natchez posted \$142.9 million in gross revenue, 10 percent more than last January. Unusually cold weather and ice storms chilled business significantly in the region a year ago.

PEPPER AWARDED THE 2002 HENNING TROPHY

The American Academy of Certified Public Managers (AACPM) recently selected Barbara C. Pepper, CPM, as recipient of the 2002 Henning Trophy.

Barbara was one of Mississippi's first CPM graduates, has held state and national offices, and is the first Mississippian to earn the Henning Trophy. She has been employed at the Mississippi Development Authority since 1989 and serves as the Office Operations Bureau Manager.

AACPM is a professional organization comprised of government managers from throughout the U.S. who have earned their certification from a nationally accredited certified public management program. Nominees for the Henning Trophy are judged numerically according to their career accomplishments, state society and Academy activities, innovations and contributions to management, and community service.

GOLF DIGEST MAGAZINE PLACES DANCING RABBIT IN TOP 75

Golf Digest has named Dancing Rabbit Golf Club at the Pearl River Resort to "America's Top 75 Golf Resorts." The award was announced in the March 2002 issue.

A first for *Golf Digest*, the ratings are based on a number of criteria, including the quality of the golf courses, dining facilities, recreational and leisure opportunities and other resort amenities. According to Dancing Rabbit, it was a unanimous choice among the 700 participants in the *Golf Digest* ratings.

In 1998, *Golf Digest* named Dancing Rabbit one of the 10 best new courses in the nation.
