STUDENTS IN MACON WIN ENERGY AWARD

JACKSON, Miss. – Students from B. F. Liddell Middle School in Macon, MS, have been selected Mississippi Junior Level Rookie School of the Year for the National Energy Education Development (NEED) Youth Awards for Energy Achievement. The Mississippi Development Authority (MDA) Energy Division will sponsor one teacher and four students from the school to attend the awards program in Washington, D. C.
