

A Proclamation
by
Governor Ronnie Musgrove

WHEREAS, prayer is a fundamental part of our national heritage, with the first National Day of Prayer proclaimed by the Continental Congress in 1775; and

WHEREAS, in 1783, the end of a long, weary Revolutionary War marked a temporary end to the National Day of Prayer; and

WHEREAS, revised as an annual observance by the Congress of the United States in 1952, the National Day of Prayer has become a tremendously unifying force for our citizens from diverse religious backgrounds; and

WHEREAS, this nation has fervently sought divine guidance as it charted what has now become the path of American history;

Now, therefore, I, Ronnie Musgrove, Governor of the State of Mississippi, hereby proclaim May 4, 2000 as

NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

in the State of Mississippi, and encourage all citizens to recognize it appropriately.
