## **Main Points**

### **1. Opportunities**

- a. Mississippians now have more opportunities in:
  - i. Education
    1. The cornerstone of our success.
    2. Eight outstanding public universities.
    3. Great community college system.
    4. Exceptional K-12 education
      - a. Computers in the Classroom
      - b. National Board Certified Teachers.
    5. Teacher pay raise
      - a. 49<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> in the nation.

- b. Our teachers are committed to our children.
    - c. Legislators must commit to them and remove the 5% revenue growth stipulation.
  - ii. Economic Development
    - 1. Advantage Mississippi Initiative
      - a. Works for all 82 counties.
    - 2. Nissan and groundbreaking.
    - 3. Hallmark Flowers distribution center in Southaven.
    - 4. (Refer to articles in newspapers about the Saints considering a move to Mississippi)
      - a. Until now, Mississippians would not have thought this was ever possible.
      - b. We have to change our attitudes also.
- b. These are our priorities – the people’s priorities.
  - i. We must use these as guidelines for our state budget.
- c. A state must have trained employees for potential new businesses.
  - i. High-tech companies must have high-tech employees.

- ii. We are investing in good jobs for our people
  - 1. The AMI gave Mississippi the competitive advantage.
- d. Give our people the opportunity for an even **better** Quality of Life

## **2. Economic Development**

- a. Advantage Mississippi Initiative
  - i. First plan in 11 years
  - ii. Now MS has a management tool to sell the state.
    - 1. We are in direct competition with our sister states
    - 2. I have told other Governor's that Mississippi will take away as much business from them as we possibly can.
      - a. We will "fight" for every opportunity we can get.
  - iii. More, higher paying jobs for people of Mississippi
    - 1. We now have a competitive advantage.
    - 2. Creates a better Quality of Life for every person in all 82 counties.

3. We need “controlled” growth in our state.
4. We must make sure that all industries are properly regulated.
5. You need to be good corporate citizens.
  - a. Consider what is in the best interest of tourism and the people who live in those communities
  - b. Where they live, work and raise their families.
6. We will use this plan to launch Mississippi into as many good opportunities in all areas.
7. (Refer to visit to Moss Point this morning, where 2 plants have closed.)
8. I would like to recognize and thank **Len Blackwell** for his work with the Mississippi Gaming Commission.

### **3. Budget**

- a. We must be responsible with the people’s money.
- b. Our budget must be honest, straightforward and fiscally sound

- c. This year, our state is growing at less than 1%
  - i. We should not budget next year's growth based on 3.7%, like the legislature proposed.
  - ii. The nation's economy is at a standstill.
  - iii. Our rate of growth, along with half the nation is sluggish.
  - iv. We cannot build our budget on hope
    - 1. We must be realistic.
- d. Using these inflated figures to build our budget for the upcoming year, will cause us to cut more money from our agencies, colleges and universities, and schools next year.
  - i. We will have to grow at 6% in 2002 to make up for the shortfall and the budget projections.
- e. We are budgeting on quicksand.
- f. The budget problem will escalate into a budget crisis!
- g. We urged the legislature to lower the estimated rate of growth from 3.7% to 1%.
- h. We should be honest with our people and make the adjustment that bases our rate of growth on a real number, if not:
  - i. We are misleading our people.

- ii. We must restore credibility and common sense to Mississippi's budget.
- i. Mississippi's families expect us to be disciplined and reasonable in how we spend their hard earned tax dollars.
- j. Education not prisons must be our state's priority.
- k. The state must ensure that kindergarten through high school is adequately funded to provide an effective education to our students.
- l. Our state's successes begin and end with education.
- m. Anytime money is cut from our state's education budgets there is cause for concern because our past investment in education is what has allowed us success in areas such as economic growth.
- n. I believe we are going to have to take an honest look at our budget and put our priorities in order.
- o. If our state's \$3 billion budget was developed using honest numbers and with education as a priority, then we could meet every education need of our state.
- p. I will continue to work with the state legislature to develop a budget that is fiscally responsible using honest numbers,

but I will not agree with a budget that ignores education and is driven by building more private prisons when we have over 2,500 vacant beds.

- Mississippi is headed forward.
- It takes everyone working together to move our state forward – locally and statewide.
- We are not going to turn back the clocks and disrupt our progress.
- We want more great opportunities for the people of Mississippi.
- We want our children to have the opportunity to live, work and raise their families here.

- Working together we can and will make it happen.
- The people of Mississippi deserve that commitment.
